

How to Use Command+Key Shortcuts on macOS

The Command key, often represented as ⌘, is a fundamental part of using macOS efficiently. It is integral to many keyboard shortcuts that can significantly enhance productivity. These shortcuts can streamline tasks such as copying and pasting text, opening new windows, and managing applications. This article will explore the various Command+Key combinations and how they can be used to improve your workflow on macOS.

Examples:

1. Basic Text Editing Shortcuts:

- **Copy (⌘C):** Copy the selected text or item to the clipboard.
- **Paste (⌘V):** Paste the contents of the clipboard into the current document or application.
- **Cut (⌘X):** Remove the selected text or item and copy it to the clipboard.
- **Undo (⌘Z):** Undo the last action. Press ⌘Z again to redo the action.

Example: Copying and Pasting Text in TextEdit

1. Open TextEdit.

Example: Searching for Files in Finder

3. Type the name of the file or folder you are looking for.
4. Press Enter to execute the search.

4. System Shortcuts:

- **Screenshot (?Shift+4):** Capture a selected portion of the screen.
- **Force Quit (?Option+Esc):** Open the Force Quit Applications window.
- **Spotlight Search (?Space):** Open the Spotlight search bar.

Example: Taking a Screenshot

1. Press ?Shift+4.
2. Drag to select the area of the screen you want to capture.
3. Release the mouse button to take the screenshot.
4. The screenshot will be saved to your desktop.
